Monroe worked as a section hand for the railroad co., as of 1920 census. As of 1920, resided in a home he owned free and clear in Cheney, WA on First St, house #802

Monroe homesteaded in the Blue Mountains of Washington in the early 1900's. It was a timber homestead, which they supplied from the town of Pommeroy. The supply trip was a day's ride by wagon. They pulled five foot salmon from Two Cannon Creek, first shooting them. They would smoke or dry the fish for the winter.

According to Paul Graham, there was a cider press down the street from the Graham family home on East Trent Street in Spokane. Monroe would take a jug down and fill it with cider. Bert was also going to make it rich on potatoes, and apparently hoarded and sorted them. He never struck it rich.
